

About the National Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS



The purpose of The National Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS is to bring national attention to the AIDS epidemic in the United States and the extraordinary role faith communities can and are playing in AIDS prevention, education, service and advocacy.

The National Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS promotes the continuous national mobilization and education of faith communities to take an even greater role in the implementation of AIDS education and services within their local communities and across the nation.



History of The National Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS

The National Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS is the inclusive, expansion of the highly successful Black Church Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS which concluded its 20th year anniversary in 2009. The Black Church Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS was the nation's FIRST national mobilization campaign that specifically focused on HIV/AIDS. The campaign has provided AIDS information to well-over 5 million African Americans through the engagement of Black congregations of every sector across the United States. The Black Church Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS was the expansion of a community-wide initiative in New York City known as The Harlem Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS.

The successful engagement of Harlem's Christian, Muslim, Jewish, and traditional faith communities brought national attention to the critical and urgent need to engage faith communities in addressing HIV/AIDS, especially in the African American community. Pernessa Seele, Founder/CEO of the Balm In Gilead, is also the visionary and founder of the Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS.

The National Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS in 2011 calls America's faith communities' of all races, creeds and cultures to prayer and to educate their congregations and others about the everalarming AIDS epidemic in the United States.

Preview of Resources



The resources in this book are presented in three sections:

Section A consists of original pieces including prayers, confessions, litanies, a lament, a praise chorus and congregational hymns. The wide variety of resources can be used for worship services, prayer meetings, weekly study, Christian education workshops HIV/AIDS support groups, individual spiritual support, and the **National Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS**. We trust that they will enrich your worship and stimulate courage and creativity to develop other worship resources which bring the needs of persons affected by HIV/AIDS into the center of our faith communities.



Section B consists of two complete worship services. These incorporate the resources from Section A into a coherent whole. The first service focuses on the theme, "Prerequisites for Prayer." The second service focuses on our theme, "Who Will Break the Silence?" Both are designed to be used either during the regular Sunday worship service or during a special service planned for the **National Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS**.

Each service is presented first in outline form with specific instructions and suggestions for worship planners and leaders. Then the full service is printed for worship bulletin purposes. The texts and new music are included following the full service.

Section C consists of fact sheets about HIV and AIDS and information on other resources available to help churches plan for the **National Week of Prayer for the Healing of AIDS**. 

I break the silence, not by might, not by power, but by my Spirit and by my Word.

End the isolation by embracing each other.

End the fear by trusting the power of my love.

End the ignorance by learning the truth.

End the denial by a willingness to be vulnerable.

Left: 0 God,

We pray for the silence, the silence in which we can hear your voice.

the silence of respect, the silence of hope, the silence of forgiveness, the silence of mercy.

We pray for the silence from which we can act together for the healing of AIDS and HIV.

Theme: Solitary place of prayer

Title: Prayer of Meditation

God, they have provided this time of silence for me to "be still," for me to touch the reality of being in a solitary place with you - in the midst of this worshipping community. I am mindful that a solitary place is a place where one can be reassured, reaffirmed and redirected in the work of ministry. You often withdrew for this purpose.

So I praise and I pray. Reassure me, Lord of Life, so that in the midst of death my steps will be redirected and my courage abound as I seek to minister in your name to persons who have HIV and AIDS. Reaffirm for me that you are the Light of the World, which cannot be extinguished, so that I will not fret or worry whether or not I am enough for the tasks ahead.

God, may I emerge from this solitary space, finding my place in a healing ministry to persons with HIV and AIDS.



Text: Mark 1:29-39
Theme: Interruptions

Title: Prayer for Interruptions

All: Our lives have been interrupted, 0 God.

One: The loom stops

because the weaver has been stricken with AIDS.

Production ceases

because a technician has been stricken with AIDS.

There are no classes today

because the teacher has been stricken with AIDS.

The music has gone silent

because the organist has been stricken with AIDS.

All: No more business as usual.

One: How many more people have to be stricken before we get it that HIV/AIDS is not going

to go away just because we ignore them?

How many more must die?

How many more orphans and widows?

All: Interruptions are not pretty, 0 God.

We are uncomfortable.

One: Interrupt our silences with your Spirit

until our denial ends

so that we can become part of the solution

instead of part of the problem.

All: Heal us all, 0 God.

In the name of Jesus. Amen.



Theme: What part do I play?

Title: A Personal Prayer in the Midst of a Church Living with AIDS

There are brothers and sisters in my community that are in desperate need of healing—healing from the ravages of HIV and AIDS. We don't even know who they are. Some of them are us. Walls of silence keep us apart. Many are fearful to speak the name of HIV and AIDS.

God, bring us all to a truly safe place filled with compassion and understanding. Bring us all to this place of safety; that the church may embody your spirit of protection and healing.

What part do I play?

Show me the way to make a difference.

Guide my hands to hold the first hand.

Open my heart to receive the first hug.

Remind me that you have chosen me. I can help.

God, awaken the spirit within me.

The Spirit that is mine is yours.

Your Spirit refreshes the soul with serenity.

Your Spirit embodies the heart with courage.

Your Spirit charts our right course with wisdom.

Help me break down the walls of separation within our community. Help me build bridges of love and understanding. Help me sweep away the debris of the isms, phobias, broken connections, and shattered hopes.

Prepare my heart to prepare your way. Encourage me to think the first thought, to make the first sound, to speak the first word. Help me break the silence.





Theme: Creation, Passion & Vulnerability

Title: Prayer from the Minister of Music

God, who brought us HMMM, OOH, and AAH, the language of music which needs no interpretation, I come to you, a servant of the chord.

I pray in the midst of AIDS that I do not lose sight of the connection between your creation, my passion, and vulnerability.

Vulnerability means risk.

Risk to be unique.

I pray for myself and for all the courage and wisdom to live in vulnerability rather than fear. And in doing so, protection comes not only from condoms and bleach, the cure will come, not only from a drug, but from within and from you, 0 God.

Worship Services



Outline and instructions

Texts: Genesis 9:8-17; Psalm 25:1-7, 19-22;

Psalm 139:1-6, 13-18; (Mark 1:9-15)

Before worship:

Pass out rainbow ribbons or stickers to each worshipper. Hang large rainbow banner in/near front of sanctuary, or prepare it to be carried in during processional. Prepare signs or banners to be used during prayer time, saying, "Is it true? Can it be? Jesus is alive and living with AIDS."

Invocation: (Psalm 25:4-5)

Scripture Reading:

Genesis 9:8-17

Introduction to the reading: "Lent, our time of preparation for the joy of Easter, begins with covenant, God's covenant with every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth."

(Gen 9:8-17). Before we pray, before we worship, before we are called to respond, God acts. God acts to establish a covenant inclusive of all."

Testimonies of Healing and Change:

Invite two or three person with HIV/AIDS to come and give very short vignettes about moments of healings and changes in their Jives That they have experienced since being diagnosed. Just a sentence or two will be good. Also invite two or three persons to testify about ways they have been ministered to by persons with HIV or AIDS.

Scripture Reading: Psalm 139:1-6, 13-18 [Printed on page 78]

Community Response: Praise Chorus "I Am"

Gospel Reading: Mark 1:9-15

Sermon: "Prerequisites for Prayer"



In addition to the prayers solicited and invited from the congregants, individuals may read the three suggested prayers: "Prayer from the Minister of Music"; "Prayer of a Black Gay Christian"; and "Personal Prayer in the midst of a church living with AIDS."

"Visuals" - As a part of the prayer time, persons, including youth, carry signs in front of congregation saying:

IS IT TRUE? CAN IT BE? JESUS IS ALIVE AND LIVING WITH AIDS!

Silence: Please allow at least 3 or 4 minutes.



The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth, who does not faint or grow weary, whose understanding is unsearchable.

God gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless.

Even youths will faint and be weary, and the young will fall exhausted; but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.

Mark 1:29-31

As soon as they left the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told him about her at once. He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up. Then the fever left her, and she began to serve them.

What Is HIV/AIDS?

HIV (Human Immunodeficiency Virus) is the virus which causes AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome). HIV usually enters the body as a result of unprotected sexual intercourse or other blood to blood contact with someone who already has the virus. HIV attacks and weakens the immune system by destroying helper T-cells, an essential part of the the immune system. HIV is fragile and cannot survive long outside the body.

- •Over time, HIV disease damages the body's immune system, allowing people to get life threatening infections.
- •When the body's immune system is severely damaged by HIV, an AIDS diagnosis is likely to be made.
- •A diagnosis of AIDS means that a person with HIV has an extremely low level of helper T Cells, or has certain illnesses.
- •Only a health care provider can make a diagnosis of AIDS.

How Is HIV Transmitted?

- •HIV can be transmitted by the exchange of infected blood, semen or vaginal fluids from one person to another.
- •Sexual transmission of HIV occurs most frequently during anal or vaginal intercourse without the use of a latex condom.
- •HIV can be transmitted by sharing contaminated needles.
- •HIV can be transmitted during oral sex.
- •Infected women can transmit the virus to their babies during pregnancy or birth and in some cases, through breast milk.
- •There is no evidence that HIV is transmitted through casual contact, such as sharing a glass, toilet seat, or toothbrush with an infected person. It is not possible to become infected by hugging or holding an HIV positive person, by breathing in the space where an HIV positive person has been, or by eating food prepared by an HIV positive person. An individual taking care of someone with HIV or AIDS is at no risk of infection if precautionary measures are taken.

HIV/AIDS IS A PREVENTABLE DISEASE

The following are recommended to prevent transmission of the virus:

- The only sure way to prevent sexual transmission of HIV is through abstinence.
- Think and talk about HIV prevention before having sex.

When engaging in anal, vaginal or oral sex use a latex condom each time (do not re-use condoms).

- During sexual activity avoid getting someone else's blood, semen or vaginal secretions into your body.
- Avoid "shooting" or taking any illegal drugs. Seek immediate assistance of a personal physician, a hospital, or detoxification center for help in overcoming any drug addiction.
- Alcohol and other drugs impair judgment may lead to unsafe practices. To learn more about condom use and other protective measures contact the AIDS hotline.
- If injecting drugs, do not share the needles (or cotton, syringe and cooker). Use new needles or needles cleaned with full strength bleach and rinsed with water each time.
- Women considering pregnancy should seek counseling to determine their risk.

HIV/AIDS Can Be A Manageable Disease

Although presently there is no cure for HIV/AIDS/ we know that people can live for many years with HIV. As treatments develop it becomes increasingly possible to treat HIV infection as a chronic but controlled condition. It is important to seek early treatment and counseling to help improve and prolong the quality of life. Currently there is a wide range of treatments available.

What Is The HIV Antibody Test?

The HIV Antibody test is not a test for AIDS, but rather for the antibody which forms in response to the presence of HIV in the blood. The antibody can be detected in most people within six weeks to six months from the time of infection.

What Does A Negative Test Mean?

- A negative antibody test means that at the time of the test there was no presence of HIV antibodies found in your system.
- It is important to continue safer sex and needle practices.
- It does not mean that you are immune to future infection with HIV.

What Does A Positive Test Mean?

- A positive HIV antibody blood test means that you are infected with HIV. Your body is producing the antibodies (the immune system's response to infection) to HIV.
- You do not necessarily have AIDS.
- A positive HIV antibody blood test results means you can infect other people with the virus.
